

## **Preparing for Shooting**

### **Insert the Batteries and Memory Card**

- Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.
  - Hold the camera upside down to prevent the batteries from falling out.



# 2 Insert the batteries and memory card.

- Confirm that the positive (+) and negative (-) battery terminals are oriented correctly and insert the batteries.
- Confirm the correct orientation and slide the memory card in until it clicks into place.



Inserting the memory card upside down or backwards could damage the camera and the memory card.

3 Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.



### **Applicable Batteries**

- Two LR6/L40 (AA-size) alkaline batteries (included batteries)
- Two FR6/L91 (AA-size) lithium batteries
- Two EN-MH2 rechargeable Ni-MH (nickel metal hydride) batteries

### Notes About the Batteries

- Do not combine old and new batteries or batteries of different makes or types.
- Batteries with the following defects cannot be used:





Batteries with insulation that does not cover the area around the negative terminal



Batteries with a flat negative terminal

### Formatting Memory Cards

The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, make sure to format it with this camera, Insert the card into the camera, press the MENU button, and select Format card (24, 664) in the setup menu.

### Removing the Batteries or Memory Card

Turn the camera off and make sure that the power-on lamp and the monitor have turned off, and then open the battery-chamber/ memory card slot cover.

Gently push the memory card into the camera (1) to partially eject the card (2).



### High Temperature Caution

The camera, batteries, and memory card may be hot immediately after using the camera.

### **Internal Memory and Memory Cards**

Camera data, including images and movies, can be saved either in the camera's internal memory or on a memory card. To use the camera's internal memory, first remove the memory card.

# Turn the Camera On and Set the Display Language, Date, and Time

When the camera is turned on for the first time, the language-selection screen and the date and time setting screen for the camera clock are displayed.

- If you exit without setting the date and time, will flash when the shooting screen is displayed.
- **1** Press the power switch to turn on the camera.
  - The monitor turns on when the camera is turned on.
  - To turn the camera off, press the power switch again.







**3** Use **▲▼** to select **Yes** and press the **®** button.



- **4** Use **◄** to select your home time zone and press the **®** button.
  - Press ▲ to turn on daylight saving time (% is displayed above the map).
     Press ▼ to turn it off.





- 5 Use ▲▼ to select the date format and press the ® button.
- **6** Set the date and time, and press the ® button.
  - Use ◆▶ to select a field and then use ▲▼ to set the date and time.
  - Select the minute field and press the button to confirm the setting.




- When the confirmation screen is displayed, use ▲▼ to select **Yes** and press the ® button.
- **8** Press the (shooting mode) button.



### Use **A** $\nabla$ to select **Scene auto selector** and press the ® button.



- The camera enters the shooting mode and you can take images in Scene auto selector mode.
- · While shooting, you can check the battery level indicator and the number of exposures remaining.
  - Battery level indicator
    - : The battery level is high.
    - : The battery level is low, Prepare to replace the batteries.
  - Number of exposures remaining The number of images that can be taken is displayed. IN is displayed when no memory card is inserted in the camera. and images are saved in the internal memory.

### The Auto Off Function

- If you do not operate the camera for about 30 seconds, the monitor turns off, the camera enters standby mode, and the power-on lamp flashes. The camera turns off after about three minutes in standby mode.
- The amount of time until the camera enters standby mode can be changed using the Auto off setting (□ 24, ♣63) in the setup menu.
- While the camera is in standby mode, the monitor turns back on if you perform any of the following operations:
  - → Press the power switch, shutter-release button, (shooting mode) button, (playback) button, or (\* movie-record) button

### Changing the Language Setting and the Date and Time Setting

### The Clock Battery

- The camera's clock is powered by a built-in backup battery. The backup battery is charged when the main batteries are inserted into the camera or when the camera is connected to an optional AC adapter, and it can run the clock for several days after about ten hours of charging.

## **Using the Camera**

### **Shooting with Scene Auto Selector Mode**

### **1** Hold the camera steady.

 Keep fingers and other objects away from the lens, flash, microphone, and speaker.



 When taking pictures in the "tall" (portrait) orientation, make sure the flash is above the lens.




### **2** Frame the picture.

- When the camera automatically determines the scene mode, the shooting mode icon changes.



# **3** Press the shutter-release button halfway $(\square 14)$ .

- When the subject is in focus, the focus area glows green.
- Multiple focus areas can glow green.
- When you are using digital zoom, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame and the focus area is not displayed. When the camera has focused, the focus indicator ( 3) glows green.
- If the focus area or focus indicator flashes, the camera is unable to focus. Modify the composition and try pressing the shutter-release button halfway again.

**4** Without lifting your finger, press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down (□ 14).




### **Using the Zoom**

When you move the zoom control, the zoom lens position changes.

- To zoom in closer to the subject: Move toward **T** (telephoto)
- To zoom out and view a larger area: Move toward W (wide-angle)

When you turn the camera on, the zoom moves to the maximum wide-angle position.

- A zoom indicator is displayed at the top of the monitor when the zoom control is moved.
- Digital zoom, which allows you to further magnify the subject up to approximately 4x the maximum optical zoom ratio, can be activated by moving and holding the zoom control toward **T** when the camera is zoomed in to the maximum optical zoom position.





### **Digital Zoom and Interpolation**

While using digital zoom, the image quality decreases due to interpolation when the zoom is increased beyond the  $\triangle$  position.



### The Shutter-release Button

#### Press halfway



To set focus and exposure (shutter speed and aperture value), press the shutter-release button lightly (halfway) until you feel a slight resistance. Focus and exposure remain locked while the shutter-release button is pressed halfway.

#### Press all the way



Press the shutter-release button all the way to release the shutter and take an image.

Do not use force when pressing the shutter-release button, as this may result in camera shake and blurred images. Press the button gently.

### Notes About Scene Auto Selector Mode

- Depending upon shooting conditions, the camera may not select the desired scene mode. In this
  case, select another shooting mode (♣4, ♣47, ♣48, ♣410).
- When the digital zoom is in effect, the shooting mode icon changes to **3**.

### Notes About Saving Images and Recording Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the maximum movie length flashes while images are being saved or while a movie is being recorded. **Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the batteries or memory card** while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

### When Using a Tripod

We recommend using a tripod to stabilize the camera in the following situations.

- · When shooting in dim lighting
- When shooting with the flash mode (��12) set to (3) (off)
- When using the telephoto setting

### **Play Back Images**

- **1** Press the ▶ (playback) button to enter playback mode.
  - If you press and hold down the (playback) button while
    the camera is turned off, the camera turns on in playback
    mode.



# 2 Use the multi selector ▲▼◀▶ to select an image to display.

- To return to shooting mode, press the button or shutter-release button.
- When M: If is displayed in full-frame playback mode, you
  can press the button to apply an effect to the image
  (→26).



Full-frame Playback

 Move the zoom control toward T (Q) in full-frame playback mode to zoom in on the image (→23).





 Move the zoom control toward W (➡) in full-frame playback mode to display a list of images called "thumbnails" (➡24).





### **Delete Images**

1 Press the (delete) button to delete the image currently displayed in the monitor.



- 2 Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select Current image and press the ® button.
  - Current image: The image currently displayed is deleted.
  - Erase selected images: Multiple images that you select are deleted (□ 18).
  - All images: All images are deleted.
  - To exit without deleting, press the MENU button.
- **3** Select **Yes** and press the **®** button.
  - Deleted images cannot be recovered.





### **Operating the Erase Selected Images Screen**

- 1 Use the multi selector ◆▶ to select an image to be deleted, and then use ▲ to display **m**.
  - To undo the selection, press ▼ to remove 📆
  - Move the zoom control (□ 1) toward T (Q) to switch to full-frame playback or W (□ 1) to switch to thumbnail playback.




- 2 Add **t** to all images that you want to delete and then press the **t** button to confirm the selection.
  - A confirmation dialog is displayed. Follow the instructions displayed in the monitor.
- Deleting the Last Image Captured While in Shooting Mode

When using shooting mode, press the to button to delete the last image that was saved.

# **Using the Flash and Self-timer**

You can use the multi selector to set frequently used functions such as the flash and self-timer.

  You can select the flash mode to match the shooting conditions.
- Self-timer ( 14)

  If you select **ON**, the camera releases the shutter 10 seconds after you press the shutter-release button
- ₩ Macro mode (♣15)
  Use macro mode when taking close-up images.
- Exposure compensation (\$\infty\$16)
   You can adjust overall image brightness.

The functions that are available vary with the shooting mode.







# Connecting the Camera to a TV, Computer, or Printer

## **Connection Methods**

You can enhance your enjoyment of images and movies by connecting the camera to a TV, computer, or printer.



- Before connecting the camera to an external device, make sure the remaining battery level is sufficient and turn the camera off. Before disconnecting, make sure to turn the camera off.
- If the AC Adapter EH-65A (available separately) is used, this camera can be powered from an electrical outlet. Do not use any other make or model of AC adapter as it may cause the camera to heat up or malfunction.
- For information about the connection methods and subsequent operations, refer to the documentation included with the device in addition to this document.

#### Viewing images on a TV





Images and movies captured with the camera can be viewed on a TV. Connection method: Connect the video and audio plugs of the Audio Video Cable EG-CP14 to the TV's input jacks.

#### Viewing and organizing images on a computer





You can transfer images to a computer to perform simple retouching and manage image data.

Connection method: Connect the camera to the computer's USB port with the USB Cable UC-E16.

#### Printing images without using a computer





If you connect the camera to a PictBridge-compatible printer, you can print images without using a computer.

Connection method: Connect the camera directly to the printer's USB port with the USB Cable UC-F16.

# **Using ViewNX 2**

Install ViewNX 2 to upload, view, edit, and share photos and movies.

## **Installing ViewNX 2**

An Internet connection is required.

For system requirements and other information, see the Nikon website for your region.



## **Transferring Images to the Computer**

- **SD card slot**: If your computer is equipped with an SD card slot, the card can be inserted directly in the slot.
- **SD card reader**: Connect a card reader (available separately from third-party suppliers) to the computer and insert the memory card.
- **Direct USB connection**: Turn the camera off and ensure that the memory card is inserted in the camera. Connect the camera to the computer using the USB cable. Turn the camera on.



## Transferring Images Saved in the Internal Memory to the Computer

Perform one of the methods listed below.

- Using Copy (
   24, 
   53) in the playback menu, copy the images saved in the internal
  memory to the memory card, and then transfer the images saved in the memory card to the
  computer.
- Connect the camera to the computer without inserting a memory card into the camera.

If a message is displayed prompting you to choose a program, select Nikon Transfer 2.

#### • When using Windows 7

If the dialog shown at right is displayed, follow the steps below to select Nikon Transfer 2.

- 1 Under Import pictures and videos, click Change program. A program selection dialog will be displayed; select Import File using Nikon Transfer 2 and click OK.
- 2 Double-click Import File.



If the memory card contains a large number of images, it may take a while for Nikon Transfer 2 to start. Wait until Nikon Transfer 2 starts.

# Connecting the USB Cable

The connection may not be recognized if the camera is connected to the computer via a USB hub.

## **2** After Nikon Transfer 2 starts, click **Start Transfer**.



• At default settings, all the images on the memory card will be copied to the computer.

#### 3 Terminate the connection.

If you are using a card reader or card slot, choose the appropriate option in the computer
operating system to eject the removable disk corresponding to the memory card, and then
remove the card from the card reader or card slot. If the camera is connected to the
computer, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.


- When you point the camera at a dog or cat, the camera detects the pet's face and focuses on it.

  - Single: Whenever the camera detects a dog or cat face, it captures one image.
  - Continuous: Whenever the camera detects a dog or cat face, it captures three images continuously.

## Pet Portrait Auto Release

- - 👼: The shutter is automatically released when the camera detects a dog or cat face.
  - OFF: The camera does not release the shutter automatically, even if a dog or cat face is detected. Press the shutter-release button.
- Pet portrait auto release is set to OFF after five bursts have been taken.
- Shooting is also possible by pressing the shutter-release button, regardless of the **Pet portrait auto release** setting. When **□ Continuous** is selected, you can take images continuously while holding down the shutter-release button all the way.

## Focus Area

- When the camera detects a face, the face is displayed inside a
  yellow border. When the camera acquires focus on a face
  displayed inside a double border (focus area), the double border
  turns green. If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the
  subject in the center of the frame.
- In some shooting conditions, the pet face may not be detected and other subjects may be displayed inside a border.

# **Smart Portrait Mode (Capturing Images of Smiling Faces)**

When the camera detects a smiling face, you can take an image automatically without pressing the shutter-release button (smile timer (��47)). You can use the skin softening option to smooth the skin tones of human faces.

- **1** Frame the picture.
  - Point the camera at a human face.
- Without pressing the shutter-release button, wait for the subject to smile.
  - If the camera detects that the face framed by the double border is smiling, the shutter is automatically released.
  - Whenever the camera detects a smiling face, it automatically releases the shutter.
- **3** End automatic shooting.
  - Perform one of the operations listed below to end shooting.
    - Set Smile timer to Off.
    - Press the button and select a different shooting mode.

## Notes About Smart Portrait Mode

Under some shooting conditions, the camera may be unable to detect faces or detect smiles ( $\bullet\bullet$ 20). The shutter-release button can also be used for shooting.

# When the Self-timer Lamp Flashes

When using smile timer, the self-timer lamp flashes when the camera detects a face and flashes quickly immediately after the shutter is released.

  - If a setting is not applied by pressing the button within a few seconds, the selection will be canceled.



#### **Available Flash Modes**

#### \$ AllTI Auto

The flash fires when necessary, such as in dim lighting.

 The flash mode icon on the shooting screen is displayed only immediately after the setting is made.

#### 4 Auto with red-eye reduction

Reduce red-eye in portraits caused by the flash (\$\infty\$13).

#### Off

The flash does not fire.

 We recommend using a tripod to stabilize the camera when shooting in dark surroundings.

#### Fill flash

The flash fires whenever an image is taken. Use to "fill-in" (illuminate) shadows and backlit subjects.

#### \$∫∫₩ Slow sync

Suited to evening and night portraits that include background scenery. The flash fires when necessary to illuminate the main subject; slow shutter speeds are used to capture background at night or under dim lighting.

## The Flash Lamp

The status of the flash can be confirmed by pressing the shutterrelease button halfway.

- On: The flash fires when you press the shutter-release button all the way down.
- Flashing: The flash is charging. The camera cannot shoot images.
- Off: The flash does not fire when an image is taken.

If the battery level is low, the monitor turns off while the flash is charging.



## The Flash Mode Setting

- The setting may not be available with some shooting modes ( 17).
- The setting applied in (auto) mode is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.

## Red-eye Reduction

Pre-flashes are fired repeatedly at low intensity before the main flash, reducing the red-eye effect. Additionally, if the camera detects red eye while saving an image, the affected area is processed to reduce red-eye before the image is saved.

Note the following when shooting:

- Because pre-flashes are fired, there is a slight lag between when the shutter-release button is
  pressed and when the shutter is released.
- More time than usual is required to save images.
- Red-eye reduction may not produce the desired results in all situations.
- In some cases, red-eye reduction may be applied to areas of an image unnecessarily. In these cases, select another flash mode and take the image again.

## **Using the Self-timer**

The camera is equipped with a self-timer that releases the shutter about ten seconds after you press the shutter-release button.

**1** Press the multi selector **◄** (**ఄ**).



- **2** Select **ON** and press the **®** button.
  - If a setting is not applied by pressing the **®** button within a few seconds, the selection will be canceled.



**3** Frame the picture and press the shutter-release button halfway.





- **4** Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down.
  - Countdown starts. The self-timer lamp flashes and then glows steadily about one second before the shutter is released.
  - When the shutter is released, the self-timer is set to OFF.
  - To stop the countdown, press the shutterrelease button again.





# The Self-timer Setting

The setting may not be available with some shooting modes (��17).



## **Using Macro Mode**

Use macro mode when taking close-up images.

**1** Press the multi selector **▼** (**⑤**).



- **2** Select **ON** and press the **®** button.
  - If a setting is not applied by pressing the **(B)** button within a few seconds, the selection will be canceled.



3 Move the zoom control to set the zoom ratio to a position where ⊕ and the zoom indicator glow green.



# Notes About Using the Flash

The flash may be unable to light the entire subject at distances of less than 50 cm (1 ft 8 in.).

- <sup>2</sup> The setting cannot be changed. Automatically changes to macro mode when the camera selects **Close-up**.

# **Focusing**

The focus area varies depending on the shooting mode.

## **Using Face Detection**

In the following shooting modes, the camera uses face detection to automatically focus on human faces.

- Portrait or Night portrait in scene mode ( 4)
- Smart portrait mode (♠68)



If the camera detects more than one face, a double border is displayed around the face that the camera focuses on, and single borders are displayed around the other faces.

If no faces are detected when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.

### Notes About Face Detection

- The camera's ability to detect faces depends on a variety of factors, including the direction in which the faces are looking.
- The camera may be unable to detect faces in the following situations:
  - When faces are partially hidden by sunglasses or otherwise obstructed
  - When faces take up too much or too little of the frame

## **Using Skin Softening**

When the shutter is released while using one of the shooting modes listed below, the camera detects human faces and processes the image to soften facial skin tones (up to three faces).

- Smart portrait mode ( 608)
- Portrait or Night portrait in (scene auto selector) mode ( 3)
- Portrait or Night portrait in scene mode ( 4)

## Notes About Skin Softening

- It may take more time than usual to save images after shooting.
- Under some shooting conditions, the desired skin softening results may not be achieved, and skin softening may be applied to areas of the image where there are no faces.

## **Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus**

The camera may not focus as expected in the following situations. In some rare cases, the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the focus area or the focus indicator glows green:

- Subject is very dark
- Objects of sharply differing brightness are included in the scene (e.g. the sun behind the subject makes that subject appear very dark)
- No contrast between the subject and surroundings (e.g. a portrait subject wearing a white shirt is standing in front of a white wall)
- Several objects are at different distances from the camera (e.g. the subject is inside a cage)
- Subjects with repeating patterns (window blinds, buildings with multiple rows of similarly shaped windows, etc.)
- · Subject is moving rapidly

In the situations noted above, try pressing the shutter-release button halfway to refocus several times, or focus on another subject positioned at the same distance from the camera as the actual desired subject, and use focus lock (��22).

#### **Focus Lock**

Focus lock shooting is recommended when the camera does not activate the focus area that contains the desired subject.

- **1** Select **□** (auto) mode (**→**10).
- Position the subject in the center of the frame and press the shutterrelease button halfway.
  - Confirm that the focus area glows green.
  - · Focus and exposure are locked.





- Without lifting your finger, recompose the picture.
  - Make sure to maintain the same distance between the camera and the subject.



**4** Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down to take the picture.



# **Playback Zoom**

Moving the zoom control toward  ${\bf T}$  ( ${\bf Q}$ ) in full-frame playback mode ( $\bigcirc$  16) zooms in on the image.



Image is displayed full-frame.

Image is zoomed in.

- You can change the zoom ratio by moving the zoom control toward W (►) or T (?).
- To view a different area of the image, press the multi selector ▲▼◀▶.
- When a zoomed image is displayed, press the button to return to full-frame playback mode.

# Cropping Images

When a zoomed image is displayed, you can press the **MENU** button to crop the image to include only the visible portion and save it as a separate file ( $\clubsuit$ 30).

# Thumbnail Playback, Calendar Display

Moving the zoom control toward **W** (►) in full-frame playback mode (□ 16) displays images as thumbnails.



- Calendar Display
- You can change the number of thumbnails displayed by moving the zoom control toward **W** (**□** or **T** (**Q**).
- While using thumbnail playback mode, press the multi selector ▲▼◀▶ to select an image and then press the **®** button to display that image full-frame.
- While using calendar display mode, press  $\blacktriangle \checkmark \blacktriangleleft \blacktriangleright$  to select a date and then press the button to display the images captured on that day.

# Notes About Calendar Display

Images captured when the camera's date is not set are treated as images captured on January 1. 2015.

# **Editing Still Images**

# **Before Editing Images**

You can easily edit images on this camera. Edited copies are saved as separate files.

• Edited copies are saved with the same shooting date and time as the original.

## Restrictions on Image Editing

- An image can be edited up to 10 times.
- You may not be able to edit images of a certain size or with certain editing functions.

  - To exit without saving the edited image, press the MENU button.

  - An edited copy is created.

# **D-Lighting: Enhancing Brightness and Contrast**

Press the ▶ button (playback mode) → select an image → MENU button → D-Lighting → 

® button

# Use the multi selector $\blacktriangle \nabla$ to select **OK** and press the $\circledR$ button.

- The edited version is displayed on the right.



## **Skin Softening: Softening Skin Tones**

Press the ightharpoonup button (playback mode) ightharpoonup select an image ightharpoonup button ightharpoonup Skin softening ightharpoonup button

- - The confirmation dialog is displayed with the face to which the effect was applied enlarged in the monitor.
  - To exit without saving the copy, press ◀.



- **2** Preview the result and press the ® button.
  - Skin tones of up to 12 faces, in the order of that closest to the center of the frame, are softened.
  - If more than one face was processed, use to display a different face.
  - Press the MENU button to adjust the amount of effect applied. The monitor display returns to that shown in step 1.



# Notes About Skin Softening

- Skin softening cannot be applied if no faces are detected in the image.
- Depending upon the direction in which faces are looking, or the brightness of faces, the camera
  may be unable to accurately detect faces, or the skin softening function may not perform as
  expected.

# Small Picture: Reducing the Size of an Image

Press the ightharpoonup button (playback mode) ightharpoonup select an image ightharpoonup MENU button ightharpoonup Small picture ightharpoonup button

- 1 Use the multi selector ▲▼ to select the desired copy size and press the ® button.
  - For images taken at an image mode setting of ### 4608×2592, only 640×360 is displayed.



- **2** Select **Yes** and press the **®** button.
  - An edited copy is created (compression ratio of approximately 1:16).



# **Crop: Creating a Cropped Copy**

- Move the zoom control to enlarge the image (♣23).
- Refine copy composition and press the MENU button.
  - Move the zoom control toward T (Q) or W (►) to adjust the zoom ratio. Set a zoom ratio at which □: W is displayed.
  - Use the multi selector ▲▼◀► to scroll the image so that only the portion to be copied is visible in the monitor.



- **3** Select **Yes** and press the **®** button.
  - An edited copy is created.



# Image Size

When the image size of the cropped copy is  $320 \times 240$  or smaller, the image is displayed at a smaller size during playback.


Use the **Rotate image** option ( $\multimap$ 52) to rotate the image so that it is displayed in landscape orientation. After cropping the image, rotate the cropped image back to "tall" orientation.

# Connecting the Camera to a TV (Viewing Images on a TV)

Connect the camera to a TV using an audio/video cable (��71) to play back images or movies on the TV.

#### 1 Turn off the camera and connect it to the TV.

Make sure that the plugs are properly oriented. Do not insert or remove the plugs at an
angle when connecting or disconnecting them.



- **2** Set the TV's input to external video input.
  - See the documentation provided with your TV for details.
- **3** Hold down the ▶ button to turn on the camera.
  - · Images are displayed on the TV.
  - The camera monitor does not turn on.

# If Images Are Not Displayed on the TV


Make sure that **Video mode** (��64) in the setup menu conforms to the standard used by your TV.

# **Connecting the Camera to a Printer (Direct Print)**

Users of PictBridge-compatible printers can connect the camera directly to the printer and print images without using a computer.

#### **Connecting the Camera to a Printer**

- Turn off the camera.
- **2** Turn on the printer.
  - · Check printer settings.
- **3** Connect the camera to the printer using the USB cable.
  - Make sure that the plugs are properly oriented. Do not insert or remove the plugs at an angle when connecting or disconnecting them.



- **4** Turn on the camera.
  - The **PictBridge** startup screen (1) is displayed in the camera monitor, followed by the **Print selection** screen (2).





#### **Printing Individual Images**

- **1** Connect the camera to a printer (*>*→32).
- 2 Use the multi selector to select the desired image and press the ® button.
  - Move the zoom control toward W (►) to switch to thumbnail playback or T (Q) to switch to full-frame playback.





4 Select the desired number of copies (up to nine) and press the ® button.



**5** Select **Paper size** and press the ® button.



- **6** Select the desired paper size and press the ® button.
  - To apply the paper size setting configured on the printer, select **Default** as the paper size
    option.
  - The paper size options available on the camera vary depending on the printer that you use.
- 7 Select **Start print** and press the ® button.
  - · Printing starts.



**8** When printing is complete, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.

- Move the zoom control toward T (Q) to switch to fullframe playback or W ( ) to switch to thumbnail playback.
- Press the ® button when setting is complete.
- When the screen shown on the right is displayed, select Start print and press the button to start printing.





#### Print all images

One copy each of all images saved in the internal memory, or on the memory card, is printed.

 When the screen shown on the right is displayed, select Start print and press the button to start printing.



**6** When printing is complete, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.

# **Recording Movies**

• When no memory card is inserted (i.e., when using the camera's internal memory), Movie options (♣54) is set to 480 m 480/30p or 480/30p. 720 m 720/30p cannot be selected.

#### **1** Display the shooting screen.


- · Check the remaining amount of movie recording time.
- If Photo info in the Monitor settings ( 505) in the setup menu is set to Movie frame+auto info, the area that will be visible in the movie can be confirmed before movie recording starts.
- When recording movies, the angle of view (i.e., the area visible in the frame) is narrower compared to that of still images.

# 2 Press the ● ( Town movie-record) button to start movie recording.

 The camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame





**3** Press the ● (\*★ movie-record) button again to stop recording.

# Maximum Movie Length

Individual movie files cannot exceed 4 GB in size or 29 minutes in length, even when there is sufficient free space on the memory card for longer recording.

- The maximum movie length for a single movie is displayed on the shooting screen.
- Recording may end before either limit is reached if camera temperature becomes elevated.
- The actual movie length may vary depending on the movie content, subject movement, or type of memory card.

#### Notes About Saving Images and Recording Movies

The indicator showing the number of exposures remaining or the indicator showing the maximum movie length flashes while images are being saved or while a movie is being recorded. **Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the batteries or memory card** while an indicator is flashing. Doing this could result in loss of data, or in damage to the camera or the memory card.

## Notes About Movie Recording

- Memory cards with an SD Speed Class rating of 6 or faster are recommended when recording
  movies ( 19). Movie recording may stop unexpectedly when memory cards with a lower Speed
  Class rating are used.
- The optical zoom ratio cannot be changed once recording starts.
- Use the zoom control to operate digital zoom while recording movies. The zoom range is between the optical zoom ratio before recording a movie and up to 4x.
- There may be some degradation in image quality when digital zoom is used.
- The sounds of zoom control operation, autofocus lens drive movement, and aperture operation
  when brightness changes may be recorded.
- Smear ( 3) visible in the monitor with movie recording is recorded with movies. Avoiding bright
  objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights is recommended.
- Depending on the distance to the subject or the amount of zoom applied, subjects with repeating patterns (fabrics, lattice windows, etc.) may have colored stripes (interference patterns, moire, etc.) in them during movie recording and playback. This occurs when the pattern in the subject and the layout of the image sensor interfere with each other; it is not a malfunction.

# Camera Temperature

- The camera may become warm when shooting movies for an extended period of time or when the camera is used in a hot area.
- If the inside of the camera becomes extremely hot when recording movies, the camera will automatically stop recording.

The amount of time remaining until the camera stops recording (**a** 10s) is displayed. After the camera stops recording, it turns itself off.

Leave the camera off until the inside of the camera has cooled.

#### Notes About Autofocus

Autofocus may not perform as expected ( 21). Should this occur, try the following:

- Set Autofocus mode in the movie menu to Single AF (default setting) before starting movie recording.
- 2. Frame another subject—positioned at the same distance from the camera as the intended subject—in the center of the frame, press the (\*★ movie-record) button to start recording, and then modify the composition.

# **Playing Back Movies**

Press the **b** button to enter playback mode.

Movies are indicated by the movie options icon (\$\infty\$54).

Press the **®** button to play back movies.

• To adjust the volume, move the zoom control ( 1).



# Notes About Image Mode

- The image mode setting can also be changed in shooting modes other than (auto) mode. The changed setting is also applied to other shooting modes.
- The setting may not be changed when using certain settings of other functions.

#### Number of Images That Can Be Saved

- The approximate number of images that can be saved can be checked in the monitor when shooting (\infty 10).
- Note that due to JPEG compression, the number of images that can be saved may vary greatly
  depending on the image content, even when using memory cards with the same capacity and
  the same image mode setting. In addition, the number of images that can be saved may vary
  depending on the make of the memory card.
- If the number of exposures remaining is 10,000 or more, the number of exposures remaining display shows "9999".

#### White Balance (Adjusting Hue)

Adjust white balance to suit the light source or weather conditions in order to make the colors in images match what you see with your eyes.



- When **Continuous** is selected, the flash cannot be used. Focus, exposure, and white balance are fixed at the values determined with the first image in each series.
- The frame rate for continuous shooting may vary depending upon the current image mode setting, the memory card used, or shooting condition.
- The setting may not be changed when using certain settings of other functions.

The camera protects selected images from accidental deletion.

Select images to protect or cancel protection for previously protected images from the image selection screen ( $\clubsuit$ 51).

Note that formatting the camera's internal memory or the memory card permanently deletes protected files (♣64).

#### The Image Selection Screen

When an image selection screen such as the one shown on the right is displayed while operating the camera, follow the procedures described below to select the images.



- 1 Use the multi selector **◄** to select an image.
  - Move the zoom control (□ 1) toward T (Q) to switch to full-frame playback or W (□ 1) to switch to thumbnail playback.
  - When selecting an image for **Rotate image**, or when using the **Print selection** screen to print individual images, only one image can be selected. Proceed to step 3.



- 2 Use ▲▼ to select or deselect (or to specify the number of copies).
  - When an image is selected, an icon is displayed with the image. Repeat steps 1 and 2 to select additional images.



- **3** Press the **(B)** button to apply image selection.
  - When Selected images is selected, a confirmation dialog is displayed. Follow the instructions displayed in the monitor.

#### **Rotate Image**

Specify the orientation in which saved images are displayed during playback. Still images can be rotated 90 degrees clockwise or 90 degrees counterclockwise.

Select an image from the image selection screen (♣51). When the Rotate image screen is displayed, press the multi selector ◀▶ to rotate the image 90 degrees.



Press the **®** button to finalize display orientation, and save orientation information with the image.

Copy images between the internal memory and a memory card.

# Notes About Copying Images

- Only files in formats that this camera can record can be copied.
- Operation is not guaranteed with images captured with another make of camera or that have been modified on a computer.

# Copying to a Memory Card That Contains No Images

When the camera is switched to playback mode, **Memory contains no images.** is displayed. Press the **MENU** button to select **Copy**.



## **Caring for the Product**

#### The Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of this Nikon product, observe the precautions described below in addition to the warnings in "For Your Safety" ( $\square$  vii - x) when using or storing the device.

## Do Not Drop

The product may malfunction if subjected to strong shock or vibration.

## Handle the Lens and All Moving Parts with Care

Do not apply force to the lens, lens cover, monitor, memory card slot, or battery chamber. These parts are easily damaged. Applying force to the lens cover could result in camera malfunction or damage to the lens. Should the monitor break, care should be taken to avoid injury caused by broken glass and to prevent the liquid crystal from the display touching the skin or entering the eyes or mouth.

## Keep Dry

The device will be damaged if immersed in water or subjected to high humidity.

## Avoid Sudden Changes in Temperature

Sudden changes in temperature, such as when entering or leaving a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation to form inside the device. To prevent condensation, place the device in a carrying case or a plastic bag before exposing it to sudden changes in temperature.

## Keep away from Strong Magnetic Fields

Do not use or store this device in the vicinity of equipment that generates strong electromagnetic radiation or magnetic fields. Strong static charge or the magnetic fields produced by equipment such as radio transmitters could interfere with the monitor, damage data saved on the memory card, or affect the product's internal circuitry.



## Do Not Point the Lens at Strong Light Sources for Extended Periods

Avoid pointing the lens at the sun or other strong light sources for extended periods when using or storing the camera. Intense light may cause deterioration of the image sensor, producing a white blur effect in photographs.

## Turn the Product off Before Removing or Disconnecting the Power Source

Do not remove the batteries while the product is on, or while images are being saved or deleted. Forcibly cutting power in these circumstances could result in loss of data or in damage to product memory or internal circuitry.

#### Notes About the Monitor

- Monitors and electronic viewfinders are constructed with extremely high precision; at least 99.99%
  of pixels are effective, with no more than 0.01% being missing or defective. Hence while these
  displays may contain pixels that are always lit (white, red, blue, or green) or always off (black), this is
  not a malfunction and has no effect on images recorded with the device.
- Images in the monitor may be difficult to see under bright lighting.
- The monitor is lit by an LED backlight. Should the monitor begin to dim or flicker, contact your Nikon-authorized service representative.

#### Notes About Smear

White or colored streaks may be visible when bright subjects are framed in the monitor. This phenomenon, known as "smear," occurs when extremely bright light strikes the image sensor; it is characteristic of image sensors and does not indicate a malfunction. Smear may also take the form of partial discoloration in the monitor during shooting. It does not appear in images saved with the camera except in the case of movies. When shooting movies, we recommend that you avoid bright subjects such as the sun, reflected sunlight, and electric lights.

#### **Batteries**

Be sure to read and follow the warnings in "For Your Safety" ( vii-x) before use.

#### Notes About Using Batteries

- Used batteries may overheat. Handle with caution.
- Do not use batteries beyond their recommended expiration date.
- Do not turn the camera on and off repeatedly if discharged batteries are inserted in the camera.

## Spare Batteries

We recommend carrying spare batteries depending on where you are shooting. It may be difficult to purchase batteries in certain areas.

## Charging Batteries

If using optional rechargeable batteries, charge the batteries before taking pictures. Batteries are not charged at the time of purchase.

Be sure to read and follow the warnings noted in the operating instructions included with the battery charger.

#### Charging Rechargeable Batteries

- Do not mix batteries with different amounts of charge remaining, or batteries of a different make or model.
- When using EN-MH2 batteries with this camera, charge two batteries at a time using Battery Charger MH-72. When using Battery Charger MH-73, charge two or four batteries at a time. Use only Battery Charger MH-72 or MH-73 to charge EN-MH2 batteries.
- When using Battery Charger MH-72 or MH-73, only charge EN-MH2 batteries.

## Notes About EN-MH1 Rechargeable Batteries and Battery Charger MH-70/71

- You can also use EN-MH1 Ni-MH rechargeable batteries with this camera.
- Use only Battery Charger MH-70 or MH-71 to charge EN-MH1 batteries.
- When using Battery Charger MH-70 or MH-71, only charge EN-MH1 batteries.
- Set the **Battery type** setting ( 24, 665) in the setup menu to **COOLPIX (Ni-MH)**.



## Notes About Rechargeable Ni-MH Batteries

- If you repeatedly charge rechargeable Ni-MH batteries while they still have some charge
  remaining, the message **Battery exhausted**. may be displayed prematurely when using the
  batteries. This is due to the "memory effect," in which the amount of charge the batteries can hold
  decreases temporarily. Use the batteries until there is no charge remaining and they will return to
  their normal behavior.
- Rechargeable Ni-MH batteries discharge even when not being used. We recommend charging the batteries just before using them.

## Cold Environment Usage

Battery performance decreases in cold environments. When using the camera in cold environments, try not to let the camera and batteries become too cold. The camera may not function if you use discharged batteries in cold environments. Keep spare batteries warm and alternate between two sets of batteries. Batteries that cannot be used because they have become too cold can often be used again when they have been warmed up.

## **B**attery Terminals

Dirt on the battery terminals can prevent the camera from functioning. Remove dirt from the terminals using a dry cloth.

## Remaining Battery Charge

If you insert discharged batteries into the camera, the camera may indicate that the batteries have adequate charge remaining. This is a characteristic of batteries.

## Recycling

Used batteries are a valuable resource. Please recycle used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Cover the battery terminals with plastic tape when recycling.



#### **Memory Cards**

- Use only Secure Digital memory cards. See "Approved Memory Cards" ( 19) for recommended memory cards.
- Observe the precautions noted in the documentation included with your memory card.
- Do not affix labels or stickers to the memory card.
- Do not format the memory card using a computer.
- The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, be sure to format it with this camera. We recommend formatting new memory cards with this camera before using them with this camera.
- Note that formatting a memory card permanently deletes all images and other data on the memory card. If there is data saved on the memory card that you wish to keep, copy that data to a computer before formatting.
- If the message Card is not formatted. Format card? is displayed when the camera is turned on, the memory card must be formatted. If there is data on the memory card that you do not want to delete, select No and press the button. Copy that data to a computer before formatting. To format the memory card, select Yes.
- Observe the following precautions while formatting the memory card, saving and deleting images, and copying images to a computer, otherwise data or the memory card itself may be damaged.
  - Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the memory card or batteries.
  - Do not turn off the camera.
  - Do not disconnect the AC adapter.

## **Cleaning and Storage**

#### Cleaning

Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Lens	Avoid touching glass parts with your fingers. Remove dust or lint with a blower (typically a small device with a rubber bulb attached to one end that is pumped to produce a stream of air out the other end). To remove fingerprints or other stains that cannot be removed with a blower, wipe the lens with a soft cloth, using a spiral motion that starts at the center of them and working toward the edges. If this fails, clean the lens using a cloth lightly dampened with commercial lens cleaner.
Monitor	Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints and other stains, clean the monitor with a soft, dry cloth, being careful not to apply pressure.
Body	Use a blower to remove dust, dirt, or sand, then wipe gently with a soft, dry cloth. After using the camera at the beach or other sandy or dusty environment, wipe off any sand, dust, or salt with a dry cloth lightly dampened with fresh water and dry thoroughly. Note that foreign matter inside the camera could cause damage not covered by the warranty.

#### Storage

Turn the camera off when not in use. Be sure that the power-on lamp is off before putting the camera away. Remove the batteries if the camera will not be used for an extended period. Do not store the camera with naphtha or camphor moth balls, or in any of the following locations:

- Next to equipment that produces strong electromagnetic fields, such as televisions or radios
- Exposed to temperatures below –10°C (14°F) or above 50°C (122°F)
- Places that are poorly ventilated or subject to humidity of over 60%

To prevent mold or mildew, take the camera out of storage at least once a month. Turn the camera on and release the shutter a few times before putting the camera away again. For storing the batteries, follow the precautions in "Batteries" (3 4) in "Caring for the Product" (3 2).

## **Troubleshooting**

If the camera fails to function as expected, check the list of common problems below before consulting your retailer or Nikon-authorized service representative.
