


# Important safety instructions

Your projector is designed and tested to meet the latest standards for safety of information technology equipment. However, to ensure safe use of this product, it is important that you follow the instructions mentioned in this manual and marked on the product.

 Please read this user manual before you operate your projector. Keep this manual in a safe place for future reference.



- 2. Always place the projector on a level, horizontal surface during operation.
  - Do not place the projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table as it may fall and be damaged.
  - Do not place inflammables near the projector.
  - Do not use if tilted at an angle of more than 10 degrees left to right, nor at angle of more than 15 degrees front to back.




Do not store the projector on end vertically. Doing so may cause the projector to fall over, causing injury or resulting in damage.



- 4. Do not place the projector in any of the following environments:
  - Space that is poorly ventilated or confined.
     Allow at least 50 cm clearance from walls and free flow of air around the projector.
  - Locations where temperatures may become excessively high, such as the inside of a car with all windows closed.
  - Locations where excessive humidity, dust, or cigarette smoke may contaminate optical components, shorten the projector's lifespan and darken the screen.



- Locations near fire alarms.
- Locations with an ambient temperature above 35°C/95°F.
- Locations where the altitudes are higher than 3000 m (10000 feet).



- 5. Do not block the vents while the projector is on 9. Do not look straight into the projector lens (even in standby mode).
  - Do not cover the projector with any item.
  - Do not place the projector on a blanket. bedding or any other soft surface.




6. In areas where the mains power supply voltage may fluctuate by ±10 volts, it is recommended that you connect the projector through a power stabilizer, surge protector or uninterruptible power supply (UPS) as appropriate to your situation.




7. Do not step on the projector or place any objects 11. The lamp becomes extremely hot during upon it.




8. Do not place liquids near or on the projector. Liquids spilled into the projector will void your warranty. If the projector does become wet, disconnect it from the power outlet and contact BenQ to have the projector repaired.


10. Do not operate the projector lamp beyond the rated lamp life. Excessive operation of lamps beyond the rated life could cause a lamp to break on rare occasions.





12. Never attempt to replace the lamp assembly until the projector has cooled down and is unplugged from the power supply.



 This projector is capable of displaying inverted images for ceiling mount installation. Use only BenQ's Ceiling Mount Kit for mounting.



## Ceiling mounting the projector


If you intend to mount your projector on the ceiling, we strongly recommend that you use a proper fitting BenQ projector ceiling mount kit and ensure it is securely and safely installed.

If you use a non-BenQ brand projector ceiling mount kit, there is a safety risk that the projector may fall from the ceiling due to an improper attachment through the use of the wrong gauge or length screws.

You can purchase a BenQ projector ceiling mount kit from the place you purchased your BenQ projector. BenQ recommends that you also purchase a separate Kensington lock compatible security cable and attach it securely to both the Kensington lock slot on the projector and the base of the ceiling mount bracket. This will perform the secondary role of restraining the projector should its attachment to the mounting bracket become loose.

14. Do not attempt to disassemble this projector. There are dangerous high voltages inside which may cause death if you should come into contact with live parts. The only user serviceable part is the lamp. See page 50.

Under no circumstances should you ever undo or remove any other covers. Refer servicing only to suitably qualified professional service personnel.



Please keep the original packing for possible future shipment. If you need to pack your projector after use, adjust the projection lens to an appropriate position, put the lens cushion around the lens, and fit the lens cushion and projector cushion together to prevent damage during transportation.

15. When you think service or repair is required, take the projector only to a suitably qualified technician.



#### Moisture condensation

Never operate the projector immediately after moving it from a cold location to a hot location. When the projector is exposed to such a change in temperature, moisture may condense on the crucial internal parts. To prevent the projector from possible damage, do not use the projector for at least 2 hours when there is a sudden change in temperature.

### Avoid volatile liquids

Do not use volatile liquids, such as insecticide or certain types of cleaner, near the projector. Do not have rubber or plastic products touching the projector for a long time. They will leave marks on the finish. If cleaning with a chemically treated cloth, be sure to follow the cleaning product's safety instructions.

### Disposal

This product contains the following materials which are harmful to human bodies and environment.

- · Lead, which is contained in solder.
- Mercury, which is used in the lamp.

To dispose of the product or used lamps, consult your local environment authorities for regulations.

## Overview

## Projector features

#### • Full HD compatible

The projector is compatible with Standard Definition TV (SDTV) 480i, 576i, Enhanced Definition television (EDTV) 480p, 576p and High Definition TV (HDTV) 720p, 1080i/p 60Hz formats, with the 1080p format providing a true 1:1 image reproduction.

#### • High picture quality

The projector provides excellent picture quality due to its high resolution, excellent home theater brightness, high contrast ratio, vivid color and rich gray-scale reproduction.

#### • Vivid color reproduction

The projector features a 6-segment color wheel to produce realistic color depth and range unattainable with lesser segment color wheels.

#### • Cinema (Rec. 709)

The mode complements the worldwide HDTV standard with accurate color and deepest contrast at lower brightness level, and is suitable for playing movies in a totally dark environment, as if in a commercial cinema.

#### Rich gray-scale

When viewed in a dark environment, the automatic gamma control provides excellent gray-scale display which reveals details in shadows and in night or dark scenes.

#### Dual OSD

Two types of OSD menus are designed for different usage scenarios: the **Basic** OSD is intuitive and easy, while the **Advanced** OSD offers full range of advanced adjustments.

#### · Wide variety of inputs and video formats

The projector supports a wide variety of inputs for connection to your video and computer equipment, including component video, composite video, personal computer (both Mac and PC), HDMI source, and an output trigger for connection to automated screen and environment lighting systems.

#### • ISF certified calibration control

To reach a higher standard of performance, the projector incorporates ISF NIGHT and ISF DAY mode settings in its OSD menus, which requires professional calibration service from authorized ISF installers.

#### • 3D function

To enjoy the 3D movies, videos, and sporting events in a more realistic way by presenting the depth of the images through HDMI.

#### • Built-in chamber speakers with audio enhancer

Built-in speakers providing mixed mono audio when an audio input is connected.

#### • Intuitive lens shift

The intuitive control over lens shift wheel provides flexibility in setting-up your projector.

#### SmartEco

SmartEco $^{\text{TM}}$  technology saves lamp power consumption up to 70% depending on the content brightness level when **SmartEco** mode is selected.





## Controls and functions

## Control panel



#### I. Focus ring

Adjusts the focus of the projected image.

#### 2. Zoom ring

Adjusts the size of the image.

#### 3. TEMPerature warning light

Lights up red if the projector's temperature becomes too high.

#### 4. OK

Confirms the selected On-Screen Display (OSD) menu item.

#### 5. POWER indicator light

Lights up or flashes when the projector is under operation.

#### 6. OPOWER

Toggles the projector between standby mode and on.

#### 7. **◄** Left / **■**

- · Decreases the projector audio volume.
- When the 2D Keystone window is displayed, manually corrects distorted images resulting from an angled projection.
- When the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, the #7, #10, and #12 keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments.

#### 8. BACK

Goes back to the previous OSD menu, exits and saves menu settings.

#### 9. LAMP indicator light

Indicates the status of the lamp. Lights up or flashes when the lamp has developed a problem.

#### I 0. Keystone/Arrow keys (▲ / ▼, ▲ / ▼)

Manually corrects distorted images resulting from an angled projection.

When the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, the #7, #10, and #12 keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments.

#### II. Top IR remote sensor

#### 12. ► Right / •(\*)

- Increases the projector audio volume.
- When the 2D Keystone window is displayed, manually corrects distorted images resulting from an angled projection.
- When the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, the #7, #10, and #12 keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments.


#### 13. SOURCE

Displays the source selection bar.

#### 14. MENU

- Accesses the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu.
- Exits and saves menu settings.

#### Remote control



#### I. ON, OFF

Toggles the projector between on and off modes.

#### 2. 3D, INVERT

Launches the **3D** menu and toggles the invert function between on and off.

## Arrow keys ( Left, ► Right, ▲ Up, ▼ Down)

When the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, these keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments.

#### 4. OK

Confirms the selected OSD menu item.

#### 5. BACK

Goes back to the previous OSD menu, exits and saves menu settings.

#### 6. MENU

- Accesses the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu.
- Exits and saves menu settings.

#### 7. Volume keys

- IOggles projector audio between on and off.
- • Decreases the projector audio volume.
- • : Increases the projector audio volume.

#### 8. KEYSTONE

Launches the **2D Keystone** window. Use **△**, **▼**,

◀, or ► to manually correct distorted images resulting from an angled projection.

#### 9. MODE

Selects an available picture mode.

#### 10. LIGHT

The LED backlight lights up and stays on for approximately 10 seconds when pressing any key on the remote control. Pressing any other keys within 10 second again turns the LED backlight off.

#### II.AUTO

Automatically determines the best picture timings for the displayed image.

#### 12. ECO BLANK

Used to blank the screen picture.

#### 13. SOURCE

Displays the source selection bar.

#### 14. Picture quality adjustment keys

These function keys perform the same tasks as specified in the OSD menu.

#### **15. FINE TUNE**

Displays the **Color Temperature Fine Tuning** window. See Color Temperature Fine Tuning for details.

#### 16. Unavailable keys

These keys are not available: PIP and SWAP.

# 17. HDMI CEC-compatible device control keys (I≪Backward, ►II Play, ►Forward,


#### ≪ Rewind, ■ Stop, ➤ Fast forward)

Goes to the previous file/Plays/Goes to the next file/Rewinds/Stops/Fast-forwards during media playback. Only available when controlling your HDMI CEC-compatible devices.

The ▶II key does not pause the video.

### Installing/replacing the remote control batteries

- 1. Press and slide open the battery cover as illustrated.
- 2. Remove the old batteries (if applicable) and install two AAA batteries. Make sure that the positive and negative ends are positioned correctly as illustrated.
- 3. Slide the battery cover back until it clicks into place.




- Avoid leaving the remote control and batteries in an excessive heat or humid environment like the kitchen, bathroom, sauna, sunroom or in a closed car.
  - · Replace only with the same or equivalent type recommended by the battery manufacturer.
  - Dispose of the used batteries according to the manufacturer's instructions and local environment regulations for your region.
  - · Never throw the batteries into a fire. There may be danger of an explosion.
  - If the batteries are drained or if you will not be using the remote control for an extended period of time, remove the batteries to avoid damage to the remote control from possible battery leakage.


### Remote control effective range

The remote control must be held at an angle within 30 degrees perpendicular to the projector's IR remote control sensor(s) to function correctly. The distance between the remote control and the sensor(s) should not exceed 8 meters (~ 26 feet).

Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control and the IR sensor(s) on the projector.

## Installation

## Choosing a location

Before choosing an installation location for your projector, take the following factors into consideration:

- Size and position of your screen
- Electrical outlet location
- · Location and distance between the projector and the rest of your equipment

You can install your projector in the following ways.

#### I. Front:

Select this location with the projector placed near the floor in front of the screen.

This is the most common way to position the projector for quick setup and portability.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Front



#### 3. Front Ceiling:

Select this location with the projector suspended from the ceiling in front of the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Front Ceiling



Purchase the BenQ Projector Ceiling Mount Kit from your dealer to mount your projector on the ceiling.

#### 2. Rear:

Select this location with the projector placed near the floor behind the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Rear



#### 4. Rear Ceiling:

Select this location with the projector suspended from the ceiling behind the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Rear Ceiling



A special rear projection screen is required.


A special rear projection screen and the BenQ Projector Ceiling Mount Kit are required.

## Obtaining a preferred projected image size

The projected image size is determined by the distance from the projector lens to the screen, the zoom setting, and the video format.

### Projection dimensions

Use the illustration and the table below to help you determine the projection distance.



 The screen aspect ratio is 16:9 and the projected picture is in 16:9 aspect ratio



<sup>(</sup> All measurements are approximate and may vary from the actual sizes. If you want a permanent installation of the projector, we recommend that you use the actual projector to physically test the projection size, distance, and the projector's optical characteristics prior to the installation. This helps you determine the exact mounting position which best suits your installation.

## Shifting the projection lens vertically

The vertical lens shift control provides flexibility for installing your projector. It allows the projector to be positioned slightly above or below the top level of the projected images.

The lens shift (offset) is expressed as a percentage of the projected image height. Use the wheel to shift the projection lens upwards or downwards within the allowable range depending on your desired image position.



Lens shift adjustment does not result in a degraded picture quality. In the unlikely event that the image distortion is produced, see Adjusting the projected image for details.

## Connection

When connecting a signal source to the projector, be sure to:

- 1. Turn all equipment off before making any connections.
- 2. Use the correct signal cables for each source.
- 3. Make sure the cables are firmly inserted.
- In the connection illustrations shown below, some cables may not be included with the projector (see Shipping contents). They are commercially available from electronics stores.

## Connecting with video equipment

You need only connect the projector to a video source device using just one of the connecting methods. Each video source provides different picture quality. The method you choose most likely depends upon the availability of matching terminals on both the projector and the video source device as described below:



## Connecting HDMI devices

HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) supports uncompressed video data transmission between compatible devices like DTV tuners, DVD players, Blu-ray players and displays over a single cable. You should use an HDMI cable when making a connection between the projector and HDMI devices.

HDMI device: DVD player, digital tuner, etc.




### Connecting smart devices

The projector can display contents directly from an MHL compatible smart device. Using an HDMI to Micro USB cable or HDMI to Micro USB adaptor, you can connect your smart devices to the projector and then enjoy your contents on the big screen.


- Some smart devices may not be compatible to the cable that you use. Please consult the manufacturer of your smart device for detailed information.
  - · Using an HDMI to Micro USB cable
  - 1. Connect one end of the HDMI to Micro USB cable to the HDMI input connector on the projector.
  - 2. Connect the other end of the HDMI to Micro USB cable to the Micro USB output socket on your smart device.
  - · Using an HDMI to Micro USB adaptor and an HDMI cable
  - I. Connect one end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI input connector on the projector.
  - 2. Connect the other end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI input socket on the adaptor.
  - 3. Connect the other end of the adaptor to the Micro USB output socket on your smart device.

After connections, switch to the **HDMI2/MHL** input source. To switch input signal, see Selecting an input source for details.




## Connecting component video devices

The RCA type component video jacks are provided for connection to component video output devices.



## Connecting video devices


Connect your video device to the projector with a composite video cable.



[ If the selected video image is not displayed after the projector is turned on and the correct video source has been selected, check if the video source device is turned on and operating correctly.

## Connecting a computer

Connect the projector to a computer with a VGA cable.




Many laptops do not turn on their external video ports when connected to a projector. Usually a key combination like Fn + F3 or CRT/LCD key turns the external display on/off. Locate a function key labeled CRT/LCD or a function key with a monitor symbol on the laptop. Press Fn and the labeled function key simultaneously. Refer to your laptop's documentation to discover your laptop's key combination.

## Connecting a wireless Full HD Kit (WDP02)


The next generation of Wireless Full HD kit is available from the place you purchased the projector.

The projector is designed to accommodate a receiver by which the projector receives a signal from a transmitter and displays transmitted images. Refer to the illustrations below for a quick connection of the wireless transmission device.

- I. Turn the power off and disconnect the projector from the power outlet. If the lamp is hot, avoid burns by waiting for approximately 45 minutes until the lamp has cooled.
- 2. Loosen the screws that secure the lamp cover on the top of the projector until the lamp cover loosens.




- 3. Remove the lamp cover from the projector.
- 4. Place the receiver into the compartment, and press it backwards and then downwards until it clicks into place.
- 5. Plug the HDMI cable and USB Mini-B cable to \*\* About the HDMI cable the receiver.



Do not strain the HDMI cable and USB cable as this could cause malfunction to the cables.


Connect appropriate AV equipment to the transmitter.



- 7. Power on the projector and switch to the HDMI3/MHL input source.
- 8. For more operation details, refer to the user manual of the Wireless Full HD Kit (WDP02).

There will be customized firmware released for the W2000 after the WDP02 is launched in 2016. It will provide more integrated functions to operate the WDP02 along with the W2000. Please contact your local BenQ service center to update the firmware of your projector should you need it.

The HDMI cable is also compatible with MHL devices. You need just to use an HDMI female to female adaptor (shorter than 4.0 cm) and a wireless MHL smart dongle (shorter than 7.9 cm) (e.g. Roku streaming stick). The projector is ready to project streaming video from the dongle wirelessly. Note that if the projector's firmware is updated to the customized version as mentioned above, the HDMI cable will not be compatible with MHL devices.




# **Operation**

## Starting up the projector

 Plug the power cable into the projector and a power outlet. Turn on the power outlet switch (where fitted). The **POWER** indicator light on the projector lights orange after power has been applied.

Please use the supplied power cable to avoid possible dangers such as electric shock and fire.

2. Press (b) on the projector or on the remote control to start the projector. As soon as the lamp lights up, a **Power On Tone** will be heard. The **POWER indicator light** flashes green and stays green when the projector is on.



The fans start operating, and a start-up image is displayed on the screen while it warms up. The projector does not respond to further commands while it is warming up.

- To turn off the ring tone, see Power On/Off Ring Tone for details.
  - 3. If this is the first time you turn on the projector, the setup wizard appears to guide you through setting up the projector. If you have already done this, skip this step and move on to step 5.
    - Use the arrow keys (◄/►/▲/▼) on the projector or remote control to move through the menu items.
    - Use **OK** to confirm the selected menu item.
- The Setup Wizard screenshots below are for reference only and may differ from the actual design.

Now you've completed the initial setup.



- 4. If you are prompted to enter the password, use the arrow keys on the projector or remote control to enter a six-digit password. See Utilizing the password function for details.
- 5. Switch on the connected equipment.
- 6. The projector starts to search for available input signals. The current input signal being scanned is displayed on the screen. If the projector does not detect a valid signal, the "No Signal" message appears. You may press SOURCE on the projector or remote control to select your desired input signal.
- 7. If the horizontal frequency of the input source exceeds the range of the projector, the "No Signal" message is displayed on the screen. It will remain on-screen until you change the horizontal frequency of the input source to an appropriate one.

## Shutting down the projector

- 1. Press ( on the projector or on the remote control. The projector displays a shutdown confirmation message.
- 2. Press (¹) or ② a second time. The **POWER** indicator light flashes orange and the fans run for about two minutes to cool the lamp. The projector doesn't respond to any commands during the cooling process.
- When the cooling process ends, a "Power Off Ring Tone" will be heard, and the POWER indicator light will show a solid orange.



To turn off the ring tone, see Power On/Off Ring Tone for details.

If the projector will not be used for an extended period, unplug the power cable from the power outlet.

Avoid turning on the projector immediately after turning it off as excessive heat may shorten lamp life. The actual lamp life may vary due to different environmental conditions and usage.

## Securing the projector

## Using a security cable lock

The projector has to be installed in a safe place to prevent theft. Otherwise, purchase a lock, such as the Kensington lock, to secure the projector. You can locate a Kensington lock slot on the projector. See item 29 on page 8 for details.

A Kensington security cable lock is usually a combination of key(s) and the lock. Refer to the lock's documentation to learn how to use it.

## Utilizing the password function

For security purposes and to prevent unauthorized use, you may set up password security via the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu. Once the password is set and the function is enabled, the projector is password-protected. Users who do not know the correct password may not use the projector.


1 You will be inconvenienced if you enable the password function yet forget the password somehow. Do make a note of your password, and keep the note in a safe place for later recall.

### Setting a password

Once a password has been set and the power on lock is enabled, the projector cannot be used unless the correct password is entered every time the projector is started.

To do this, first and foremost, you have to access the Advanced OSD menu (see page 28 for details).

- 1. Go to System Setup: Advanced > Password to display the Password window.
- 2. Select Change Password and press OK to display the Input New Password window.




- 3. As the window indicates, the four arrow keys (▲/►/▼/◄) respectively represent 4 digits (1, 2, 3, 4). Use the arrow keys on the projector or remote control to set a six-digit password. The digits are displayed as \*\*\*\*\* when you enter them.
- 4. Re-enter the same password to verify and return to the **Password** window.
- 5. Select **Power On Lock** and use **◄/▶** to set **On**.
- 6. Enter the current password to enable the function.
- 7. Press BACK to save your changes and exit.

### If you forget the password

If you enable the password function, you'll have to enter your password each time you turn on the projector. Once you enter an incorrect password, the error message is displayed, and the **Input Password** window follows.

You can retry by entering another six-digit password, or if you absolutely do not remember it, use the password recall procedure. See Entering the password recall procedure for details.

If you have entered an incorrect password 5 times in succession, the projector will automatically shut down in a short time.

### Entering the password recall procedure

- 1. Make sure the Password window is displayed on screen, then press and hold **AUTO** on the remote control for 3 seconds. The projector will display a coded number on the screen.




- 2. Write down the number and turn off the projector.
- 3. Seek help from the local BenQ service center to decode the number. You may be required to provide proof of purchase documentation to verify that you are an authorized user of the projector.
- The "XXX" shown in the above messages are numbers that vary depending on different models.

### Changing the password

To do this, first and foremost, you have to access the **Advanced** OSD menu (see page 28 for details).

- 1. Go to System Setup: Advanced > Password to display the Password window.
- 2. Select Change Password and press OK to display the Input Current Password window.



- 3. Use the arrow keys on the projector or remote control to enter the old password.
  - If the password is correct, the **Input New Password** window is displayed.
  - If the password is incorrect, the password error message is displayed, and the Input Current
    Password window appears for your retry. You can either try another password or press
    BACK to cancel the change.
- 4. Enter a new password.
- 5. Re-enter the same password to verify.
- Po make a note of your password, and then keep the note in a safe place for later recall.
  - 6. You have successfully set a new password. Remember to enter the new password next time you turn on the projector.
  - 7. Press BACK to save your changes and exit.

### Disabling the password function

To do this, first and foremost, you have to access the Advanced OSD menu (see page 28 for details).

- Go to System Setup: Advanced > Password to display the Password window.
- 2. Select **Power On Lock** and use **◄/**▶ to set **Off**.
- 3. Enter the current password.
  - If the password is correct, the Password window displays that Power On Lock is Off. You will
    not be asked to enter the password next time you turn on the projector.
  - If the password is incorrect, the password error message is displayed, and then the Input
     Password window is displayed for your retry. You can either try another password or press
     BACK to cancel the change.
- 4. Press BACK to save your changes and exit.
- Though the password function is disabled, you need to keep a note of the old password in case you ever need to re-activate the password function by entering the old password.

## Selecting an input source

The projector can be connected to multiple equipment at the same time. However, it only displays one full screen at a time. When starting up, the projector automatically searches for the available signals.

If you want the projector to always automatically search for the signals:

- Under the Advanced OSD menu, go to the System Setup: Basic menu, and enable Auto Source. (see "Auto Source" on page 41)
- Under the Basic OSD menu, if there's no signal connected to the projector, go to Auto Source and
  enable it; if there are signals connected, go to the Settings menu, and then enable Auto Source.
  (see "Auto Source" on page 31 and 32)

To select the video source:

1. Press **SOURCE** on the projector or remote control to display the source selection bar.



- Press ▲ /▼ until your desired signal is selected and press OK.
   Once detected, the selected source information is displayed on the screen for seconds. If there are multiple pieces of equipment connected to the projector, repeat steps I-2 to search for another signal.
- The native display resolution of this projector is in a 16:9 aspect ratio. For best display picture results, you should select and use an input signal which outputs at this resolution. Any other resolutions will be scaled by the projector depending upon the Aspect Ratio setting, which may cause some image distortion or loss of picture clarity. See "Aspect Ratio" for details.

## Renaming an input source

You may rename the current input source on the source selection bar.

To do this, first and foremost, you have to access the Advanced OSD menu (see page 28 for details).

- 1. Press **MENU** and then use  $\blacktriangleleft/\triangleright$  to go to **System Setup**: **Basic**.
- 2. Press ▼ to select Source Rename and press OK to display the Source Rename window.
- 3. Press  $\triangle/\nabla/\blacktriangleleft/\triangleright$  until your desired character is selected.
- 4. When done, press **BACK** to save your changes and exit.

## Adjusting the projected image

## Adjusting the projection angle


The projector is equipped with a quick-release adjuster foot and two rear adjuster feet. These adjusters change the image height and projection angle.

To adjust the projection angle:

- I. Press the quick-release button and lift the front of the projector. Once the image is positioned as desired, release the quick-release button to lock the foot in position.
- Screw the rear adjuster feet to fine-tune the horizontal angle.

To retract the foot, hold up the projector while pressing the quick-release button, then slowly lower the projector. Screw the rear adjuster foot in a reverse direction.

If the screen and the projector are not perpendicular to each other, the projected image becomes vertical trapezoidal. To correct this, see Correcting keystone for details.



Do not look into the lens while the lamp is on. The strong light from the lamp may cause damage to your eyes.

Be careful when you press the quick-release button as it is close to the exhaust vent where hot air comes from.

## Auto-adjusting the image


In some cases, you may wish to optimize the picture quality of PC signal. To do this, press **AUTO** on the remote control. Within 3 seconds, the built-in Intelligent Auto Adjustment function will re-adjust the values of Frequency and Clock to provide the best picture quality.

The current input source information will be displayed in the corner of the screen for 3 seconds.

This function is only available when PC signal is selected.

## Fine-tuning the image size and clarity

- · To adjust the projected picture size:
  - i. Slide open the lens compartment cover (see item 6 on page 8).
  - ii. Turn the zoom ring to zoom in or zoom out.
  - iii. Slide close the lens compartment cover when you complete the adjustments.
- To sharpen the picture:
  - i. Slide open the lens compartment cover (see item 6 on page 8).
  - ii. Rotate the focus ring to achieve a sharper focus.
  - iii. Slide close the lens compartment cover when you complete the adjustments.




### Correcting keystone

Keystoning refers to the situation where the projected image is noticeably wider at either the top or bottom. It occurs when the projector is not perpendicular to the screen.


To correct this, besides adjusting the height of the projector, you may correct this manually in ONE of these ways:

- Use the remote control Press KEYSTONE to display the 2D Keystone window.
- Using the projector
   Press ▲/w or ▼/ to display the 2D Keystone window.



The illustrations below show how to correct keystone distortion:

- To correct keystoning at the top of the image, use ▼ or ▲/▼.
- To correct keystoning at the bottom of the image, use ▲ or ▲/▼.
- To correct keystoning at the right side of the image,
   use ◀ or ◀/ •.
- To correct keystoning at the left side of the image, use ➤ or ➤ / □•).
- To reset the keystone values, press BACK for 2 seconds.
- To enable the vertical Auto Keystone function, press OK for 2 seconds.

When done, press **BACK** to save your changes and exit.


# Menu Functions

## About the OSD Menus

To let you make various adjustments or settings on the projector and the projected image, the projector is equipped with 2 types of multilingual On-Screen Display (OSD) menus:

- Basic OSD menu: provides primary menu functions. (See Using the Basic OSD menu)
- Advanced OSD menu: provides full menu functions. (See Using the Advanced OSD menu)

To access the OSD menu, press **MENU** on the projector or remote control.



The first time you use the projector (after finishing the initial setup), one of the following **Basic** OSD menu overviews will be displayed, depending on whether or not a video signal is connected.

If you intend to switch from the **Basic** OSD menu to the **Advanced** OSD menu, follow the instructions below:

- Use the arrow keys (◀/▶/▲/▼) on the projector or remote control to move through the menu items, and use OK to confirm the selected menu item.
  - When there is a video signal connected to the projector
    - i. Go to the **Settings** > **Menu Type** menu and press **OK**.
    - ii. Use **▲/▼** to select **Advanced** and press **OK**.
    - iii. Press BACK again to access the Advanced OSD menu.
  - When there is NO video signal connected to the projector
    - i. Go to the **Menu Type** menu and press **OK**.
    - ii. Use **▲/▼** to select **Advanced** and press **OK**.
    - iii. Press BACK again to access the Advanced OSD menu.

Next time you turn on the projector, you may access the Advanced OSD menu by pressing MENU.



#### Black Level


Sets the picture grayscale to 0 IRE or 7.5 IRE.

The grayscale video signal is measured in IRE units. In some areas which use NTSC TV standard, the grayscale is measured from 7.5 IRE (black) to 100 IRE (white); however, in other areas where PAL equipment or Japanese NTSC standards are used, the grayscale is measured from 0 IRE (black) to 100 IRE (white). We suggest you to check if the input source is with 0 IRE or with 7.5 IRE, and then make your selection accordingly.

#### Gamma Selection

Gamma refers to the relationship between input source and picture brightness.

- 1.6/1.8/2.0/2.1/BenQ: Select these values according to your preference.
- **2.2/2.3**: Increases the average brightness of the picture. Best for a lit environment, meeting room or family room.
- 2.4: Best for viewing movies in a dark environment.
- 2.6/2.8: Best for viewing movies which are mostly composed of dark scenes.

**Lamp Power** 

#### Brilliant Color

This function utilizes a new color-processing algorithm and system level enhancements to enable higher brightness while providing truer, more vibrant colors in picture. It enables a greater than 50% brightness increase in mid-tone images, which are common in video and natural scenes, so the projector reproduces images in realistic and true colors. If you prefer images with that quality, select **On**. Selecting **Off** disables **Brilliant Color**, and **Color Temperature** becomes unavailable for access at the same time.

#### Color Temperature Fine Tuning

Allows you to manually adjust the pre-defined color temperature modes:

- 1. Press OK to display the Color Temperature Fine Tuning window.
- Press ▲/▼ to select the item(s) you want to make changes and use ◀/► to adjust the values.
  - Red Gain/Green Gain/Blue Gain: Adjusts the contrast levels of Red, Green, and Blue.
  - Red Offset/Green Offset/Blue Offset: Adjusts the brightness levels of Red, Green, and Blue.
- 3. When done, press **BACK** to save your changes and exit.

The function is accessible through the remote control.

#### Color Management


In most installation situations, color management is not necessary, such as in classroom, meeting room, or lounge room situations where lights remain on, or where building external windows allow daylight into the room.

Only in permanent installations with controlled lighting levels, such as boardrooms, lecture theaters, or home theaters, should color management be considered. Color management provides fine color control adjustment to allow for more accurate color reproduction.

Proper color management can be achieved under controlled and reproducible viewing conditions. Use a colorimeter (color light meter) and provide a set of suitable source images to measure color reproduction. These tools are not provided with the projector, however, your projector supplier should be able to give guidances or send an experienced professional installer for you.

The **Color Management** function provides six sets (RGBCMY) of colors to be adjusted. You can select any of them to adjust its color range and saturation.

- 1. Press **OK** to display the **Color Management** window.
- Select Primary Color and use ◀/► to select a color from Red, Green, Blue, Cyan, Magenta, and Yellow.
- Press ▼ to select Hue and use ◀ /► to set its range. Increase in the range will
  include colors consisted of more proportions of its two adjacent colors.



The illustration shows how the colors relate to each other.

For example, if you select **Red** and set its range at 0, only pure red is selected. Increasing its range will include both the red color close to yellow and red color close to magenta.

- 4. Press ▼ to select Saturation\* and use ◀/► to adjust its values. Every adjustment made reflects to the image immediately. For example, if you select Red and set its value at 0, only the saturation of pure red will be affected.
- Press ▼ to select Gain and use ◀ / ▶ to adjust its values. The contrast level of the primary color you just selected are affected. Every adjustment made reflects to the image immediately.
- 6. Repeat steps 2 to 5 until you have made all of the desired adjustments.
- 7. When done, press **BACK** to save your changes and exit.

It is the amount of that color in a video picture. Lower settings produce less saturated colors; a setting of "0" removes that color from the image entirely. If the saturation is too high, that color will be overpowering and unrealistic.

The function is accessible through the remote control.

#### Noise Reduction

Reduces electrical image noise caused by different media players. The higher the value, the less the noise.

#### Film Mode

Enhances picture quality when projecting composite image from a filmsourced DVD or Blu-ray Disc. Setting **Off** disables the function.

# **Maintenance**

## Care of the projector

Your projector needs little maintenance. The only thing you have to do on a regular basis is keep the lens clean.

Never remove any parts of the projector except the lamp. Contact your dealer or local customer service center if the projector fails to operate as expected.

### Cleaning the lens

Clean the lens whenever you notice dirt or dust on the surface.

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off using the proper shutdown procedure (see Shutting down the projector), unplug the power cable, and let it cool down completely.

- Use a canister of compressed air to remove dust.
- If there is dirt or smears, use lens-cleaning paper or moisten a soft cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens surface.
- Never use any type of abrasive pad, alkaline/acid cleaner, scouring powder, or volatile solvent, such as
  alcohol, benzene, thinner or insecticide. Using such materials or maintaining prolonged contact with
  rubber or vinyl materials may result in damage to the projector surface and cabinet material.
- Never touch the lens with your finger or rub the lens with abrasive materials. Even paper towels can damage the lens coating. Only ever use a proper photographic lens brush, cloth, and cleaning solution. Do not attempt to clean the lens while the projector is switched on or is still hot from previous use.

### Cleaning the projector case

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off using the proper shutdown procedure (see Shutting down the projector), unplug the power cable, and let it cool down completely.

- To remove dirt or dust, wipe the case with a soft, dry, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt or stains, moisten a soft cloth with water and a neutral detergent. Then wipe the case.
- PNever use wax, alcohol, benzene, thinner or other chemical detergents. These can damage the case.

### Storing the projector

To store the projector for an extended time:

- Make sure the temperature and humidity of the storage area are within the recommended range for the projector. Refer to Specifications or consult your dealer about the range.
- · Retract the adjuster feet.
- Remove the batteries from the remote control.
- · Pack the projector in its original packing or equivalent.

### Transporting the projector

It is recommended that you ship the projector with its original packing or equivalent.

## Lamp information

### Getting to know the lamp hour

When the projector is in operation, the duration (in hours) of lamp usage is automatically calculated by the built-in timer.

Total (equivalent) lamp hour =  $2.0 \times$  (hours used in **Normal** mode) +  $1.4 \times$  (hours used in **Economic** mode) +  $1.0 \times$  (hours used in **SmartEco** mode)

To obtain the lamp hour information:

- Press MENU and then use the arrow keys (◄/►/▲/▼) to go to Information (while under the Basic OSD menu) or Settings > Information (while under the Advanced OSD menu).
- 2. The Lamp Usage Time information is displayed.
- 3. Press BACK to exit.

or

- Under the Advanced OSD menu, press MENU and then use the arrow keys (◄/►/▲/▼) to go to
   System Setup: Advanced > Lamp Settings.
- 2. Press **OK** to display the **Lamp Settings** window.
- 3. Use ▼ to select Lamp Timer and press OK, the Lamp Timer information is displayed.
- 4. Press BACK to exit.

### Extending lamp life

The projection lamp is a consumable item. To keep the lamp life as long as possible, you can do the following settings via the **Advanced** OSD menu.

### Setting Lamp Power

Setting the projector in **Economic** or **SmartEco** mode extends the lamp life.

Using **Economic** mode reduces system noise and power consumption by 30%. Using **SmartEco** mode reduces system noise and lamp power consumption by up to 70%. If the **Economic** or **SmartEco** mode is selected, the light output will be reduced and result in darker projected pictures.

- 1. Under the Advanced OSD menu, go to Picture > Lamp Power.
- 2. Press **OK** to display the **Lamp Power** window.
- 3. Press ▲/▼ to move to your desired mode, and press OK to save your changes and exit.

### Setting Auto Off

This function allows the projector to turn off automatically if no input source is detected after a set period of time.

- 1. Under the Advanced OSD menu, go to System Setup: Basic > Auto Off.
- 2. Press ◀/▶ to select a time period. If the preset time lengths are not suitable for your presentation, select **Disable**, and the projector will not automatically shut down in a certain time period.
- 3. When done, press **BACK** to save your changes and exit.


### Timing of replacing the lamp

When the Lamp indicator lights up red or a message appears suggesting it is time to replace the lamp, please install a new lamp or consult your dealer. An old lamp may cause a malfunction in the projector and in some instances the lamp may explode. Go to <a href="http://www.BenQ.com">http://www.BenQ.com</a> for how to purchase a replacement lamp.

The LAMP indicator light and TEMP warning light will light up if the lamp becomes too hot. Turn the power off and let the projector cool for 45 minutes. If the LAMP or TEMP indicator still lights up after turning the power back on, please contact your dealer. See Indicators for details.





  - To reduce the risk of electrical shock, always turn the projector off and disconnect the power cable before changing the lamp.
  - To reduce the risk of severe burns, allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes before replacing the lamp.
  - To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and damage to internal components, use caution when removing lamp glass that has shattered into sharp pieces.
  - To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and/or compromising image quality by touching the lens, do not touch the empty lamp compartment when the lamp is removed.
  - This lamp contains mercury. Consult your local hazardous waste regulations to dispose of this lamp in a proper manner.
  - To assure optimal performance from the projector, it is recommended that you purchase a qualified projector lamp for lamp replacement.
  - If lamp replacement is performed while the projector is suspended upside-down from the ceiling, make sure that no one is underneath the lamp socket to avoid any possible injury or damage to the human eyes caused by fractured lamp.
  - Ensure good ventilation when handling broken lamps. We recommend that you use respirators, safety glasses, goggles or face shield and wear protective clothing such as gloves.
  - I. Turn the power off and disconnect the projector from the power outlet. If the lamp is hot, avoid burns by waiting for approximately 45 minutes until the lamp has cooled.
