The History

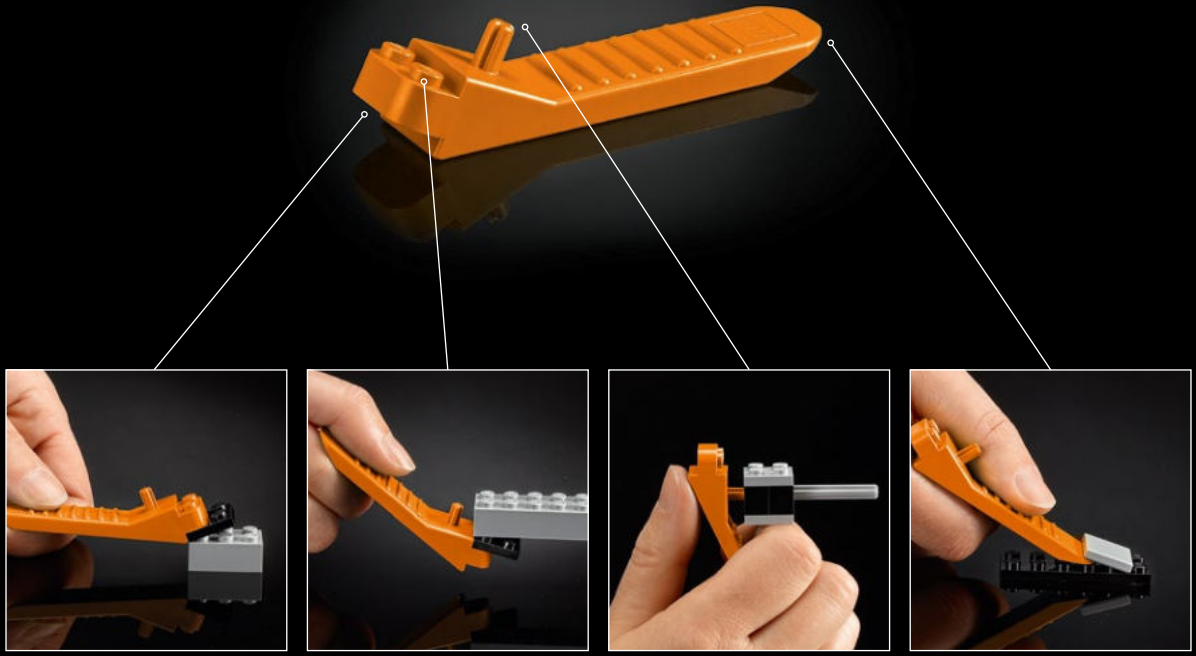
The first president, George Washington, selected the site in 1791 and a competition design submitted by Irish-born architect James Hoban was chosen a year later. During the War of 1812, the British set fire to The White House and James Hoban was appointed to rebuild it. Completed once again in 1817, there have been countless renovations and additions since.



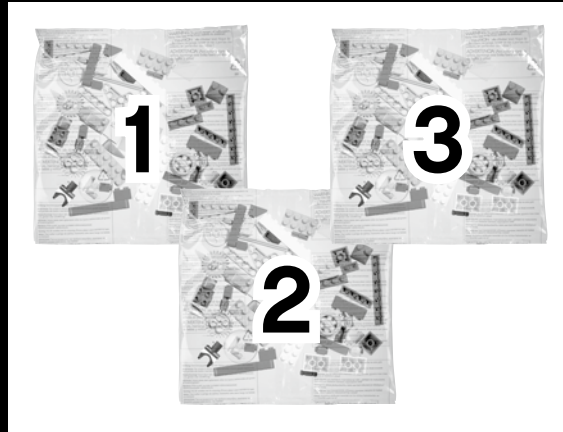

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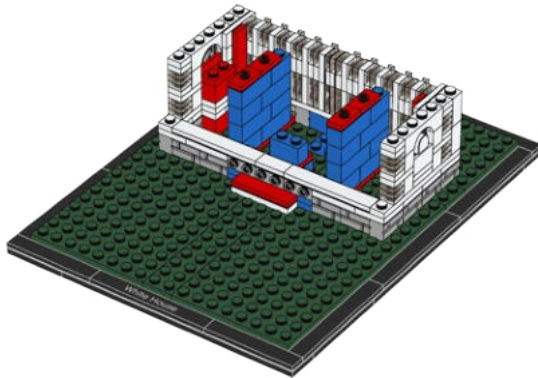
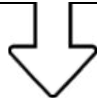


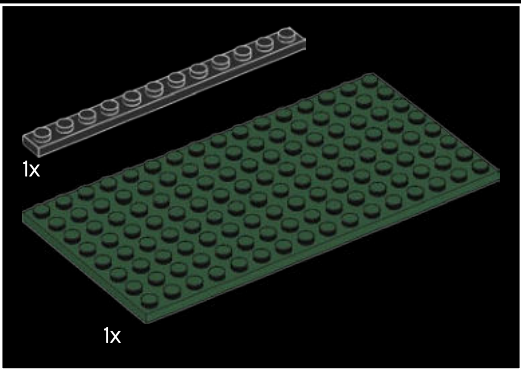
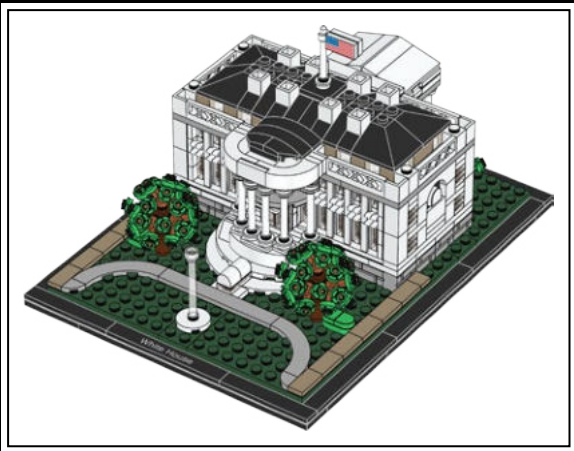


A Grand Mansion

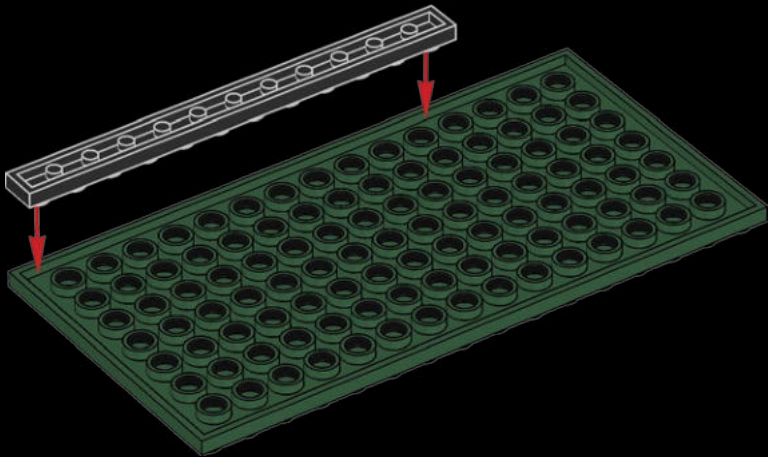


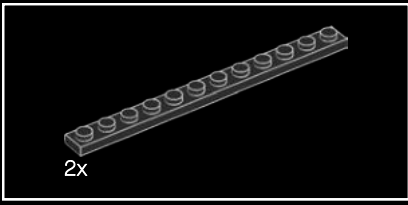

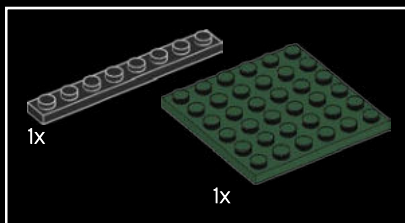
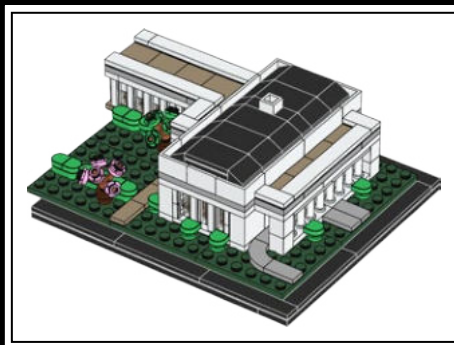


The East Wing

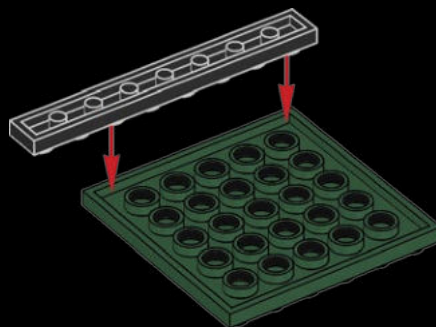
The original East Wing was completed in 1902 and served mainly as an entrance for formal visitors during large social gatherings. The building we see today was added in 1942, primarily to cover the construction of an underground shelter and emergency operations center for Franklin D Roosevelt. Traditionally the East Wing now serves as office space for the first lady and her staff.

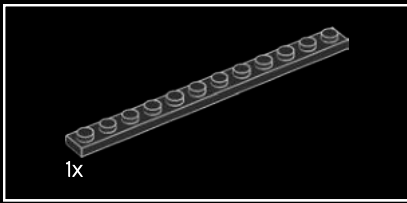


The East Wing of the White House in 1992

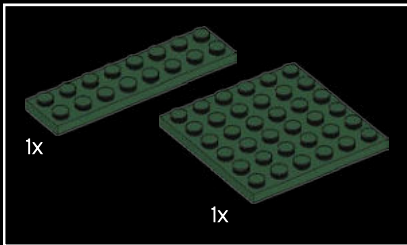
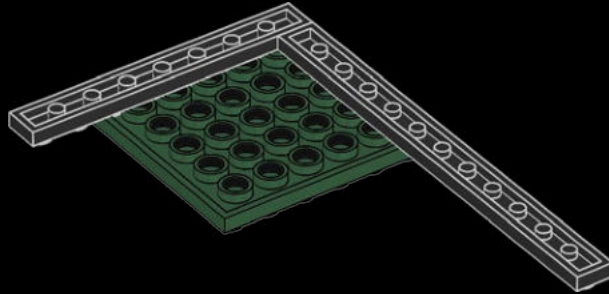

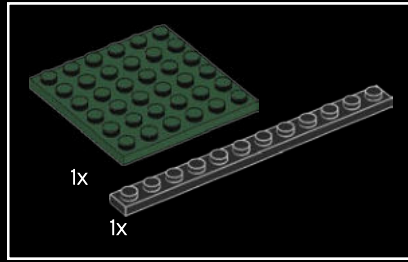
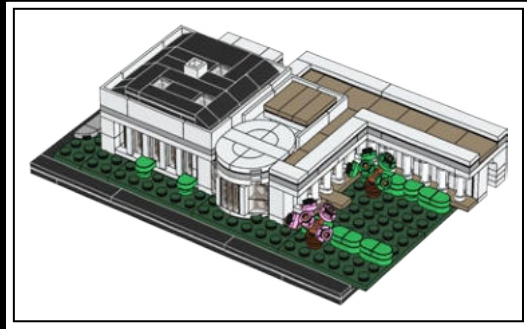
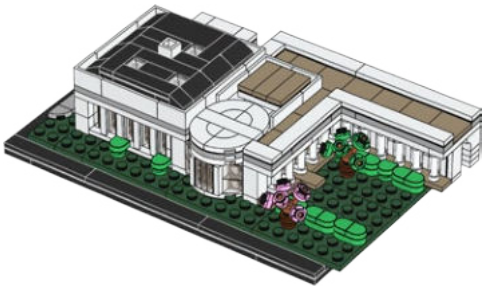
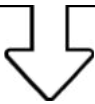
Windows of the Oval Office, the office of the US President, in the West Wing of the White House
